Examples Where Combustion Engines are Prohibited

1. FLORIDA - SARASOTA COUNTY

Municode - Sarasota County, FL

Sec. 130-36. - Operation of Motorboats on County Lakes and Ponds.

- (a) Definitions. As used in this section, the following words and phrases shall have the following meanings, unless the context clearly indicates otherwise:
- (1) Motorboat means any boat or vessel longer than four feet, which is propelled or powered by any type of internal combustion engine, including personal watercraft as defined in F.S. § 327.02.
- (2) Operate means to navigate or otherwise use a Motorboat.
- (3) Person means an individual, association, firm, partnership, corporation, trust, or other legal entity.
- (b) Motorboats prohibited. No person shall Operate any Motorboat upon the waters of any lakes or ponds located within any County owned or operated park in Sarasota County, Florida.

2. FLORIDA- LAKE ALFRED, FL (POLK COUNTY)

Hilochee - Fishing

Enjoy freshwater fishing opportunities on numerous natural and man-made lakes and ponds, including catches of game fish such as largemouth bass, crappie and several species of sunfish. On the Main Unit, boats with internal combustion engines are prohibited, fishing is by permit only and is restricted to daylight hours on Saturdays and Sundays. Fishing permits are free and may be obtained by calling the Southwest Regional Office at (863) 648-3200.

4. FLORIDA – EVERGLADES CITY, FL (MIAMI/MONROE/COLLIER COUNTY)

Everglades - National Park Florida

Park Boating Regulations

In addition to <u>Coast Guard Regulations</u> and <u>Florida State Regulations</u>, the following <u>Everglades National Park</u> regulations apply:

Motors Prohibited

Combustion engines and/or trolling motors must be removed from the boat's transom and/or bow before entering the areas below:

- All Freshwater lakes, including Paurotis and Nine Mile Ponds.
- Noble Hammock and Hells Bay Canoe Trails (Park Road to Lard Can).
- Long Lake to the mouth of Garfield Bight. *Note* Watercraft with engines of 6 hp or less are permitted on West Lake, but not beyond.
- Little Henry, Henry, Monroe, Middle and Seven Palm Lakes.
- Joe and Snag Bays and all inland creeks and lakes north of Long Sound, except for the ponds and lakes associated with Taylor River.
- Coot Bay Pond, Mud Lake and Bear Lake.
- The Homestead Canal and all small lakes along the canal.
- All associated small lakes on Cape Sable inland from Lake Ingraham.

Reservoir Rules

No flotation devices should be operated on Project Waters with an internal combustion engine or power plant. (The engine or power plant must be removed from the watercraft.) This is strictly enforced.

Electric motors are permissible.

State regulations on boat registration, life jackets and fishing licenses apply.

Special Regulations

In order to comply with various state and local environmental and safety concerns, CSA strictly enforces the following special regulations at the Hinckston Run, Quemahoning, and Wilmore Reservoirs:

The use of internal combustion engines is strictly prohibited on the reservoirs. Internal combustion engines, their fuel storage containers, and any other petroleum consuming device **may not be possessed** while boating these waters.
