2. Historical Significance

Explain the historic significance of the property, site, or resource(s) that is the subject of the proposed project - (Maximum characters 1500.)

The Warm Mineral Springs Cyclorama was designed during an architectural movement in the 1950's which adapted international style of architecture to the climate and geographical setting of southwest Florida. The building was designed in 1958 by Jack West, an architect from the Sarasota School of Architecture.

The Cyclorama was constructed in 1959 for the purpose of celebrating the second phase of Florida's Quadricentennial. The Quadricentennial celebrated 400 years of Florida's history. The one-story Cyclorama is a round gallery building which contains colorful three-dimensional life size statues and nine 13 feet tall paintings depicting Ponce de Leon's quest for the Fountain of Youth beginning with his arrival in Florida and his journey across the state. During the Quadricentennial event, viewers stood in near darkness before a narration, by radio broadcaster Lowell Thomas, began to play. The narration, and accompanying video display, can be found on YouTube and is the second link in the attachment titled, *Social Media Sites*, in Optional Materials.

The Cyclorama is located in Warm Mineral Springs Park. The park property has historic significance dating back to the Paleoindian Period. The Springs property was listed on the National Register in 1977. There is a 325-foot diameter archaeological sensitivity zone surrounding the spring.

On May 23, 2019, the Florida National Register Review Board supported the National Register nomination for Warm Mineral Springs Park buildings, including the Cyclorama, under the category: *The Influence of New Architects, 1953-1959 Categories A and C*.

The building is currently closed to the public due to safety and building code concerns. The building was closed in 2000 while the property was in private ownership. The City of North Port is proposing to rehabilitate the Cyclorama and open the exhibit to the public.

1. Scope of Work - (Maximum characters 5000) *

In the space provided below, briefly describe the scope of work for the project for which funding is requested. List the work items that will be completed during the grant period using the funds requested and the required match.

The City of North Port is requesting funds to restore the Warm Mineral Springs Cyclorama and reopen the building for public enjoyment. A professional design and architectural team, paid for solely by the City of North Port, will begin project design late summer 2019. Design will be complete before grant funding becomes available, making this project shovel ready. The Florida Building Code – Existing Building, and the Secretary of Interior’s Standards and Guidelines for Archaeology and Historic Preservation will be the controlling document for any alteration, rehabilitation, restoration, retrofit or repair of the building. Plans for all renovations will be submitted for Building Official approval under historic standards that would enable the structures to be renovated under the original design criteria. The City will prepare technical specifications and prepare a formal solicitation which meets the grant conditions. An award will be made to a qualified construction company. The scope of work, specific to this grant request, includes:

- Mechanical, Electrical and Lighting Repairs: The mechanical system is located in the middle of the Cyclorama. The electrical panel box and all electrical components will be brought up to code. The HVAC system and duct work will be replaced. A new lighting system will also be installed.
- Roof Repairs: The Cyclorama Structure consists of approximately 4,215 SF under roof. The structure is built of 8-inch concrete masonry units surrounding a steel support structure consisting of steel columns and bar joists. Roof attachments will be modified to enhance the roof’s ability to accept high wind loading. The roof deck will be treated or replaced, and the multi-ply built up roof will be replaced on the Cyclorama and entry building.
- Stucco, Ceiling, Window, Floor, Door and Wall Repairs: The artwork on the outside of the Cyclorama does not have historical significance and will be removed. Damaged areas on outside walls will be repaired, the walls will be cleaned, prepared, and new stucco will be applied. The existing coating is a skim coat of stucco and any new application will be required to have a similar texture to maintain historical relevance. Three stone tile sculptures depicting a conquistador, a priest, and a Native American have been installed on the exterior walls of the Cyclorama. This occurred after the period of significance. The tiles will be relocated to another place on the Warm Mineral Springs property. Inside, ceiling tiles will be replaced. Minor repairs will be made to the walls inside the Cyclorama. Wall and ceiling repairs will be made to the entry building as well. New impact resistant windows will be installed. New doors will also be installed. The floors will be refinished. Repairs, such as coatings and material protection applications, will be verified for use in historic applications.
- American’s with Disability Act (ADA) and Safety Upgrades: Concrete viewing steps surround the mechanical center. There is an access ramp originating at the Cyclorama west entrance and rising to the top viewing step. Neither the step riser height nor the access ramp slope is in accordance to current code and accessibility requirements and is unsafe. The ramp and first two rows of stairs will be modified to allow ADA accommodation (preliminary plan is included in Support Materials, Architectural Drawings).
- Historical Mural Restoration: Some of the statues have fallen over and are not correctly aligned with the paintings. Sand from the original arrangement has spread away from the wall. The Ponce de Leon exhibit in the Cyclorama will be restored.

Before the building is opened to the public, the City will seek volunteers to serve as a docent to answer questions and monitor visitors. There will be advertising for the reopening of the Cyclorama, acknowledging the State Department of Historic Resources as a funding contributor. As of now, the exhibit will be free and open to the public. The City may consider adding an entrance charge in the future.

In its current condition, the building cannot be opened to the public due to ADA and structural building code upgrades needed. Structural and mechanical elements of the building are at the end of their useful life and replacement of major components is imminent. Maintenance costs may be anticipated to increase with time and many maintenance scenarios may require the facility to be closed in an unpredictable and untimely fashion. Doing nothing will prove costly as time goes on and that the City will continue to face alternatives involving major restoration.

The City of North Port counts every visitor to the Park. Currently, the City welcomes 100,000 visitors a year. If the Cyclorama reopens, this number is expected to increase.

3. Anticipated Economic Impact - (Maximum characters 1500.)

Explain the direct economic impact this project will have on the surrounding community. Include any information regarding number of jobs it will provide, if known.

Warm Mineral Springs Park is a tourist destination popular with the Eastern European population seeking health benefits of the spring. Increased tourism will benefit North Port, Sarasota County and the State of Florida tax base. A Warm Mineral Springs Park wayfinder fountain titled, "Three Graces", at the corner of U.S. 41 and Ortiz Boulevard, was recently rehabilitated. This small step is one of many to increase tourism to this historical and archeological gem found in North Port. Reopening the Cyclorama is another step towards increasing tourism to Warm Mineral Springs Park.

Six direct jobs are expected with the rehabilitation and reopening of the Cyclorama. The Cyclorama will require daily cleaning. This will increase the cleaning crew and create two jobs. Regular roofing, electrical, air conditioning and plumbing maintenance will be required. This is expected to create another three jobs. The City hires an outside company to run Warm Mineral Springs. If visitation to the Springs increases, one additional staff member is anticipated to be hired. There is a significant indirect job impact from housing and business opportunities expected if the Cyclorama reopens.

4. Benefit to Minorities and the Disabled - (Maximum characters 1500.)

When the Cyclorama is restored and opened to the public, it will be ADA compliant. Currently, the structure cannot be opened to the public due to safety issues. The concrete ramp and concrete viewing steps are not ADA compliant and will be modified to create accessibility to the exhibit. At this time, no media content is anticipated. If media content is added in the future, all options for the disabled will be considered and implemented.

Ponce de Leon's quest for the Fountain of Youth did not occur without conflict. His journey across the southeastern coast of Florida, and claiming the territory for the Spanish crown, changed the life of Florida native tribes forever. It is thought that Ponce de Leon encountered the Calusa tribe, which is now extinct.

Current day Warm Mineral Springs Park is a melting pot. Visitors come to Warm Mineral Springs from countries all over the world seeking the perceived medicinal benefits of the waters. In 2012, the community came together to create and install a sculpture at Warm Mineral Springs titled, "Mandalas for World Peace". The sculpture is currently being repaired from being in the weather elements and needs a new indoor home. With the removal of the ramp and viewing steps in the Cyclorama and rehabilitation of the entry area, there

will be areas for future exhibits. The sculpture could be a good addition to promote world peace and understanding. History on the Calusa tribe will also be considered for future exhibit development.

5. Educational Benefits and Public Awareness - (Maximum characters 1500.)

It is estimated that 30 cycloramas exist in the world, with less than 10 located in the United States. The intention of the renovation to the Warm Mineral Springs Park Cyclorama is to provide the public with a space for reflection on American history, including an important part of Florida's tribal history relative to the Spanish Conquistadors and Ponce de Leon's quest for the Fountain of Youth. It is expected that the opening of the Cyclorama will attract visitors, school field trips and educational tours.
